### FROM THE CEO

My interest in oncology started when I was a 4th year medical student at the University of Manchester (UK). I completed my honours project in gastric cancer at the Christie's Hospital (UK) and that was my first introduction to a cancer hospital, passionate researchers and inspiring patients. It was also where I started my first research publication in the British Journal of Cancer.

After obtaining my medical degree and UK medical internship in 2011, I flew to Perth with the hopes of settling closer to family and to enjoy the year-round sunshine. No more rainy Manchester! I had to adjust to not bringing umbrellas with me when I went out. As a junior doctor, I got to see cancer patients for the first time whilst covering other doctors on leave at Royal Perth and Sir Charles Gairdner Hospital. To my pleasant surprise, the experience was incredibly satisfying and rewarding. Despite the dread of giving bad news, I got so encouraged by how the patients faced their day-to-day lives with cancer. That was also when I fell in love with oncology - we get to use treatments that could potentially give someone more time with their own family. It was very meaningful.

When I started my oncology training in Adelaide, I discovered my interest in research and wrote my first combination drug study trial in bowel cancer, hoping to make a new drug accessible to the Australian public and to ascertain if this treatment combination was safe and efficacious. I also had the opportunity to provide expert reviews on the related anticancer drug treatments and authored a book chapter in this area.

Given my specific interest in breast cancer, I applied and was accepted into the breast cancer fellowship training at Peter MacCallum Cancer Centre (Petermac), Melbourne. Life was never the same! It was such a privilege to share the same vision and passion for cancer research; to treat patients with the highest standards and discuss treatment strategies aspiring to provide the best treatments possible. I had the opportunity to further my training in breast cancer familial genetics and risk management, translational research and molecular genetics. As a result, further international journal articles were generated here during my training.

After obtaining my specialist gualification, I continued to work as a consultant at the Petermac breast unit. Here, I was also awarded the NHMRC PhD scholarships to study the role of circulating tumour DNA (liquid biopsy) in breast cancer in 2017. I set up my first liquid biopsy study at Petermac and at Austin Hospital in Melbourne, aiming to use liquid biopsy as a tool to look for early sign of cancer return after treatment completion in women with high risk early breast cancer.

When COVID-19 landed in Australia and was invading Melbourne, my family moved to Adelaide and I took up a consultant position at Lyell McEwin Hospital, mainly treating women with breast cancer. Here, I established satellite study sites for liquid biopsy and drug studies, wanting to improve patient access to drugs targeting specific mutations to better outcomes.

Fast forward to October 2021, my family has moved to Perth and I was lucky enough to meet Prof Arlene Chan and her legendary team at BCRC-WA. I was struck by their vision, dedication and passion in breast cancer cutting edge research and treatment and was overjoyed to be part this team in providing excellent and comprehensive service to women with breast cancer. It is my absolute pleasure to be here and I look forward to be at your service!



2022 has been a significant year for BCRC-WA as we continue to see the growth of our Breast Clinic, providing breast health services and same-day screening for our patients. Our goal is to ensure that patients receive a streamlined and coordinated service.

As part of our growing team of PBCI medical professionals, I am pleased to welcome our two new Oncologists, Dr Louisa Lo and Dr Peter Lau. An introduction to Dr Lo features on page 2. We are thrilled to see the growth of our medical team and the benefits this will have for our new and existing patients.

### PAM SELIGMANN'S JOURNEY WITH CANCER ·

a husband's perspective

This story is about Arlene Chan and the BCRC-WA contribution to Pam's journey with cancer over the past 19 years.


65 years ago as a precursor to a career selection interview, my housemaster told me that there were only 2 important choices in life - career and wife. My wife Pam and I managed to get both choices right first time, allowing us the opportunity to spend 50 remarkable years together - Pam's 19 year journey with cancer and the impact on this of Arlene Chan and the BCRC-WA represented close to 40% of those 50 years.

However the story really goes back to 1990 when I retired. There were several reasons I decided to retire but the overriding one was that a couple of years previously in 1988 Pam had had a breast cancer operation. Although at the time we were assured that the nature of the cancer was such as not to pose any significant risk of reoccurring, Pam and I decided that I should retire to allow us to focus on enjoying our remaining life together. This turned out to be another important choice that we got right.

I like to consider the interaction with and influence of Arlene Chan and the BCRC-WA in terms of 4 phases:

#### 1. The first 5 years from 2003 under Arlene's care

The first year was extremely challenging physically and mentally with chemotherapy, radiotherapy and 13 consultations, 9 with Arlene. But the three things I particularly remember are all positive - Arlene encouraging my involvement, her focus on maintaining a normal life style and the empathy and trust she created with us. At Pam's first consultation with Arlene in April 2003, Arlene encouraged my attendance at the consultation; during Pam's journey with cancer I attended some 50 of Pam's consultations with Arlene. The side effects of some of the treatments, particularly the chemotherapy and radiotherapy were extremely debilitating. However Arlene's approach of wherever possible scheduling consultations and treatments to allow her patients to enjoy their normal lifestyle allowed Pam and me to enjoy a fabulous four day break at Broome's Cable Beach Resort between her 4th and two final chemo sessions and 3 months later to enjoy 3 weeks in the SW of France before starting radiotherapy. It was amazing how helpful these breaks away from treatment were for Pam. For some, Arlene's empathy with her patients might seem to be understated. It never was for us with the warm welcome and smile at the start of every consultation and the high five when Arlene cleared Pam at the end of the 5 years.







2. The next 10 years from 2008 - 'cancer free' trips to Thailand, New Zealand, Melbourne, an annual 3 month winter escape to Broome 3 of our annual one month Christmas The next 10 years were really about what we managed to do stays at Parry Beach Camping Ground, 4 annual Busselton during these so called 'cancer free' years. A lot of travel including Cinefest Film Festivals and just under 6 months away in our boating in France, a cooking school in Italy, New Zealand twice, beloved caravan; it allowed Pam and the Lovely Smocking Ladies Vietnam and visits to every state in Australia during which we to raise some \$10,000 for BCRC-WA by sale of smocked dresses; travelled 90,000km and spent a total of nearly 2 years in our and pre-hospitalisation it allowed Pam to attend the PYNKS getcamper trailer and caravan. It also included Pam setting up togethers at Zamia. This in turn resulted in her teaching some of her Lovely Smocking Ladies group as well as the West Coast the PYNKS group how to smock. Pam and the PYNKS smocking Community smocking ladies, St Phillips Cottesloe smocking and ladies continued having fun smocking right up to 6 weeks before ultimately the PYNKS smocking ladies, all of whom smocked her death. This PYNKS camaraderie was extended to texting fortnightly on behalf of the BCRC-WA. At one point during this between PYNKS members with the hospital named 'the Resort', period Pam was hospitalised for 4 days with the cause of the Arlene 'the Resort Manager', being discharged 'being evicted', problem never satisfactorily diagnosed. Arlene was consulted in chemo in the day ward going to 'the day spa', and scans/xrays case it was cancer related. Fortunately it was not but I still recall 'a photo shoot', 'with cocktails' if contrast was required. Arlene saying with a smile "You had me worried Pam".

#### 3. The final 3 years from 2018 under Arlene's care again but now with the additional support of the BCRC-WA.

Like that first year in 2003, these final 3 years were challenging physically and mentally but so much less than they might have been. By this time Arlene had established the BCRC-WA and PYNKS and Arlene and her team at BCRC-WA made an immense contribution to the enjoyment Pam and I had of those last 3 years. Again Arlene's focus on lifestyle allowed us to undertake

But Arlene and the BCRC-WA had also moved into new premises with the obvious benefit of having much easier access to the increasing range of technical resources Arlene had and was continuing to build up. However for us there were other less obvious benefits - Einsteins excellent little cafe on the 4th floor provided extra opportunity for Pam and me to interact with Arlene's staff in a less formal manner; and more convenient parking, significantly cheaper if use of the free 15 minute drop-off and pick-up facility was optimised.

Finally and most importantly, people. I am not great on naming people but three do deserve special mention:

On our first visit to BCRC-WA's new facility, Kylie was at reception and dealing with 4 parties simultaneously, 3 on 2 phones and us at the counter. Unflustered she handled all 4 with calm and courtesy. Pam and I immediately named her Kylie the Wonder Woman. Some time later at home, Pam's health deteriorated suddenly to the extent of needing immediate hospitalisation. My call to BCRC-WA for help was answered by Kylie, half an hour later we were met at hospital reception and Pam taken immediately to a room in Gosse Ward.

Pam and I constantly needed advice on how to deal with all the ups and downs of those last three years of her life and Amanda Goddard was always available to give it and to organise at very short notice the necessary facilities and treatment - on at least 2 occasions, she organised Pam's admission to hospital at very short notice; from her diary I know how much Pam valued Amanda's care during her final 12 days in hospital; and Pam's move to the "special large room" which Amanda organised for her final week made all the difference to Pam's last few days.

When the return of Pam's cancer was diagnosed 4 years ago, life expectancy for someone in her condition was of the order of 12 months. Arlene and her BCRC-WA team made a major contribution to Pam managing an extra 2 years and allowed her to enjoy 3 years of doing the things she loved with the people she loved, an enjoyment which I shared. But Arlene also ensured that during the last 12 months of her life Pam experienced little pain and discomfort, particularly during the last few weeks. Arlene personally managed Pam's last 24 hours to ensure a truly peaceful end, free of pain and discomfort with her closest friend and me by her side, holding her hands when she died.

#### 4. The 6 months since Pam died.

It is now 6 months since Pam died and friends assume that I must be missing her. I feel almost guilty when I say that to date I am not, using being busy with executor duties as an excuse. But the reality is that one of the major reasons is that Arlene Chan and the BCRC-WA helped us manage those last 19 years so well that the transition to life without Pam so far has been almost seamless. Contact with friends stimulates memories of the many thinas we managed to do and the fun we shared together during those years. And these memories invariably have a picture of Pam smilina at me.

### IMPACT OF COVID-19 AND THE DIAGNOSIS AND TREATMENT

The COVID-19 infection clusters started in December 2019 in Wuhan, China and was later declared a global pandemic by the World Health Organisation (WHO) on March 11, 2020. Since then, international efforts of border lockdown, quarantine, and vaccine development quickly ensued to try and curb rising COVID-19-related hospitalisation and complications.

#### Are COVID-19 vaccines less effective in cancer patients?

A study of 439 cancer patients on active cancer treatment was recently published from Europe. Though the protective antibody levels against COVID-10 decreased as few as three to six months after two vaccinations, these levels increased to good protective levels after the third vaccine booster dose. Side-effects after the third dose were similar in patients who do and do not have cancer. These included injection site pain (46.9%), fatigue (15.6%), fever or chills (10%). Based on these study results, the third booster vaccination is strongly recommended to all cancer patients.

Compared to other cancer patients, breast cancer patients recover and fare better when compared to patients with other types of cancer. There is some evidence that women undergoing active cancer treatment at the time of COVID-19 diagnosis appear "protected" and have fewer complication from COVID-19 and recover more fully. As with the general population a small number of women (8%) may experience "long COVID-19". From the current scientific evidence, it is concluded that breast cancer patients can safely proceed with cancer treatment during the COVID-19 pandemic and that cancer treatment has no impact on the risk of COVID-19 complications.

#### What else can I do after I am fully vaccinated?

As advised by the Australian Technical Advisory Group on Immunisation (ATAGI), it is still important to continue practising good hygiene, physical-distancing and other COVID-safe recommendations after you have been fully vaccinated. All women with breast cancer are advised to refer to and adhere to up-to-date Australian COVID public health advice.

Thus, at this time point women with breast cancer are advised to have all three COVID-19 vaccinations. Whether a fourth vaccine booster is needed is not clear at present. It needs to be remembered that the degree of immunosuppression varies with different chemotherapy drugs. So, men and women being treated for blood cancers or those who have had an organ transplant, are generally more 'immunosuppressed' than a breast cancer patient. Also remember, that those patients who are receiving anti-HER2 therapy, are not regarded as receiving an 'immunotherapy'. Nevertheless, if you develop symptoms suggestive of COVID-19, you should get tested, report the test result to your oncologist and alert the WA Health Department with attendance at one of the city-wide COVID clinics. Be guided by your treating medical oncologist as to how to modify or delay your breast cancer treatment if you are on chemotherapy or tablets which can lower your immunity.

RUTHY AND Alejandra


In 2018, Sisters Ruthy and Alejandra were both battling breast cancer, diagnosed only two months apart. They shared the highs and lows of this disease, and in July 2021 Alejandra's cancer had returned, spreading to her liver and bones.

Ruthy and Aleiandra share that sister bond and were both treated under Breast Cancer Research Centre-WA. Ruthy and her family have done a 500k walk to support Alejandra and to give back to BCRC-WA.

'My darling sister Alejandra and I both battled breast cancer four years ago (2 months apart) but now my darling sister's cancer has returned and metastasised to her liver and bones. She has been undergoing treatment for the past few months and has recently re-commenced chemo. As a family, my husband, daughters and I decided to walk 500km over a two week period to raise funds for the Breast Cancer Research Centre-WA (BCRC-WA) who continue to assist Aleiandra and have also assisted me in my battle with this terrible disease. This started from the 21st of Feb till the 6th of March. In addition, I shaved my head in support of my sister'.

We are privileged to play a small part in the stories of our patients. Giving back can be a powerful way to support your loved ones and to give to a worthy cause. Donations to BCRC-WA go towards continuing our support services and reshaping the future of breast cancer treatment.


Some people walked the 7km, and the rest of us walked the 14km walk. We may have been hot, had a few aches and pains and been slow to move the next day, but it was all worth it.
