SUZANNE'S

I am not a singer or a politician. Just Suzanne, a 63 year old woman who was diagnosed with early stage unilateral Breast Cancer (Oestrogen and HER2 positive) in 2017.

I have a strong, resilient body and so the diagnosis seemed to be meant for another me, a Suzanne in a parallel universe. I have always had difficulty reconciling myself with being a cancer patient. I felt like an imposter, as though I did not belong in the waiting room of cancer specialists. Yet there I was.

I was fortunate enough to receive the Golden Ticket referral to the wonderful Dr Willsher/Professor Chan team at Hollywood Hospital. With expertise, care and dedication they guided me through a maze of surgical and medical procedures which included a mastectomy, referral for reconstruction, chemotherapy, Herceptin infusions and Tamoxifen. Thanks to them, I have emerged through the final gate of the maze, healed and hopeful. I feel my prize of health and well-being is like a lovely garden I have been given to tend and nurture with care.

This story would not be complete without including my breast reconstruction with Plastic Surgeon, Dr Ian Timms. When I first walked into Dr Timms's Clinic in Subiaco, I thought I would be the odd one out in a waiting room full of would-be Kim Kardashians. On the contrary, Dr Timms works hard to employ his wonderful surgery and artistry to a wide range of people including women like me. He has helped me to smile inside, to walk a little taller and to feel whole again. Now I have no need to dwell on what I have lost but work on the present and make something out of this messiness we call life.

My story ends with a biopsy. At the 5-year mark, I was expecting a gold star and to be sent on my merry way. Instead, I had need for a biopsy, this time on my healthy breast. I felt knocked silly by this final blow. I was no longer proceeding in ignorance. I had travelled this road, and it had many hills and rough surfaces. I remember walking among the historic granite guarries near my home and found my favourite tree, a very old Cork Oak, planted back in the days when the guarries were being worked. Under its graceful canopy, I stood and cried. I pressed my face to the corky bark and felt comfort from the resilience of this beautiful tree.

After what seemed like an agonising wait, I received my results. My tears were unfounded. I never did receive that gold star, but I was pronounced clear of cancer and sent on my merry way.

Thank you to my three amazing specialists. And thank you to my family, both close and extended, for all those words of encouragement. They meant so much and helped me to stay strong and positive.

RESEARCH SUCCESS

New Paper Published

A new research article titled "Prognostic role of immune environment in luminal B early breast cancer" has been published in Cancer Medicine. The study was funded by a grant from Helen Sewell.

The research found that in patients with a certain type of breast cancer (hormone receptor-positive and HER2 negative), the immune environment around the tumour was not found to be a significant factor in predicting the risk of cancer recurrence. This is in contrast to other types of breast cancer (triple negative or HER2 positive), where the immune environment does play a role.

This research suggests that immune therapy may be less effective for breast cancer patients with hormone receptor-positive and HER2 negative tumours.

New Trial

We have some exciting news about a new international trial that we're participating in. The trial will involve 6000 women who have hormone receptor-positive early breast cancer, and they will be given a new type of drug called SERDs (Selective Estrogen Receptor Degraders).

The aim of the trial is to see if the new drug is better at preventing breast cancer from returning compared to the current drugs like tamoxifen or aromatase inhibitors.

Women who have previously taken an endocrine drug for at least 2 years but not more than 5 years may be eligible for this trial. The medical oncologists at PBCI will discuss this trial with their patients to determine if it is a good option for them to consider.

WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW ABOUT **GENETIC TESTING AND COUNSELLING**

for Familial Breast Cancer

Breast cancer is a complex disease that is influenced by a variety of factors, including genetics. Genetic counselling is an essential part of the care and management of individuals with breast cancer.

Genetic Counsellors are registered healthcare professionals under the umbrella of the Human Genetics Society of Australasia (HGSA). Genetic Counsellors have specialized education in genetics and are trained to assist patients in making informed decisions about their genetic health. They work with doctors to help make appropriate recommendations for ongoing surveillance Consulting with a Genetic Counsellor is a two-way flow of and management of increased cancer risk for their patients.

Genetic counselling is a communication process that aims to help individuals, couples and families understand and adapt to the medical, psychological, familial, and reproductive implications of the genetic contribution to specific health conditions.

In this article, our resident genetic counsellor, Bhavya Vora, answers questions he often receives from breast cancer patients regarding genetic testing and counselling.

Why do I need counselling when I just want to be tested?

Genetic testing does not always provide a yes or no, black-andwhite answer. It is important to discuss these limitations as well as other potential implications before proceeding with genetic testing.

Whilst Genetic Counsellors indeed have training in counselling, these skills are most often used in the collection and provision of genetic information. Some of the topics covered at your appointment include providing an overview of the genetic

testing process and considering the outcomes in the context of an individual and their family. The session provides you with an opportunity to raise concerns, ask questions, plan and prepare for results, and organise relevant management options.

information aimed at promoting informed decision-making. It helps to tailor the testing and information for you and your family. In addition, it assists the counsellor to create resources to support family communication about genetic health and provides links for valuable support services such as clinical psychology or cancer support groups.

When should genetic testing for familial breast cancer genes be considered?

You could consider cancer genetic testing if you fall into one of the below categories:

- You are diagnosed with cancer at a young age
- · There is a known gene fault identified in your family and you would like to know your risk.
- You have a family history of cancer and no living affected individual is available or interested in genetic testing.
- · You are concerned about your lifetime risk of developing cancer



How will a positive genetic test result affect me? How will it affect my family members?

If a pathogenic variant is identified, it will explain your cancer diagnosis. It will also inform you of an increased risk for other associated cancers in your lifetime. In some instances, it could also infer the treatment plan, and help you make relevant decisions regarding surgical management options.

Most familial cancer conditions are dominant, in other words, each first degree relative of an individual with a genetic variant will have a 1 in 2 chance of inheriting the pathogenic variant. These family members could be informed of their risks, enabling them to discuss their options of genetic testing and risk management discussions.

Where can I get tested?


Patients of the Perth Breast Cancer Institute (PBCI) have access to my services. I work closely with the multidisciplinary team at PBCI to provide excellent patient-centred care. The service is dedicated to offering an appointment to everyone who is referred with a minimum wait period and quick turnaround time for the genetic test results

For those being cared for outside of PBCI, please ask your primary care physician about being tested.

I donated 'Boob 1' to the Breast Cancer Research Centre - WA in 2015 when it was still located at The Mount Hospital. I was inspired by my mother who battled the disease but passed away at the age of thirty-nine. My grandmother had also fought and lost. I vividly remember the bravery, the chemo, the sadness and the chaos it brought to my family.

During my yearly mammogram in 2022 DCIS was discovered in my right breast and my journey began. Visiting the new suites at Hollywood Hospital I knew I was in safe hands with Kallyani Ponniah as my surgeon, having genetic testing done and just the wonderful support I received. I decided to have a double mastectomy and I am back in the gym and grabbing my second life with both hands.

I always imagine grabbing a giant paintbrush and brightening up the entire world - buildings, streets, cafes, trees, gardens and of course my favourite, flowers.


I want to turn up the volume of colour and have that same beautiful naivety of a child experiencing the absolute joy of colours.
